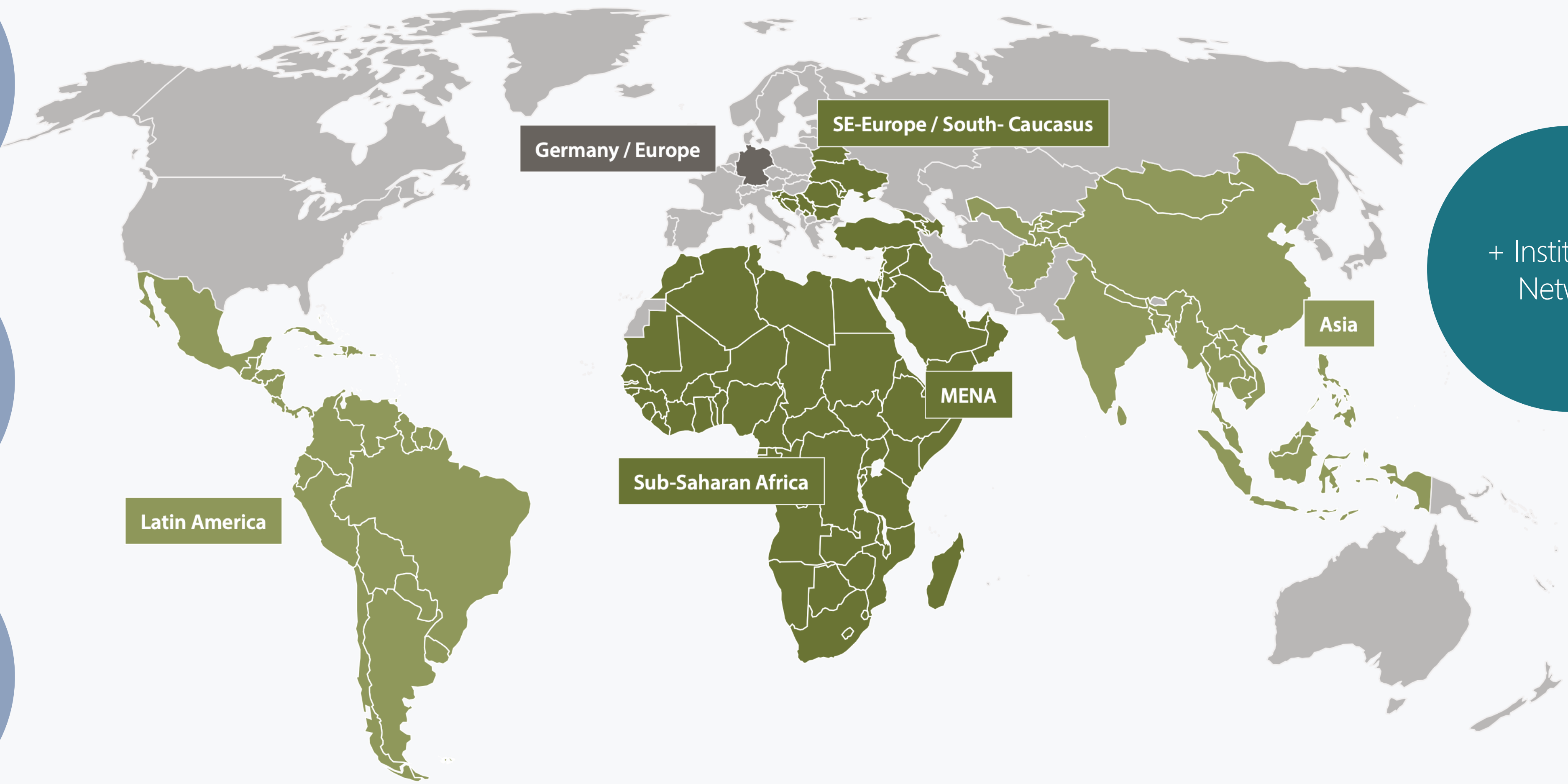

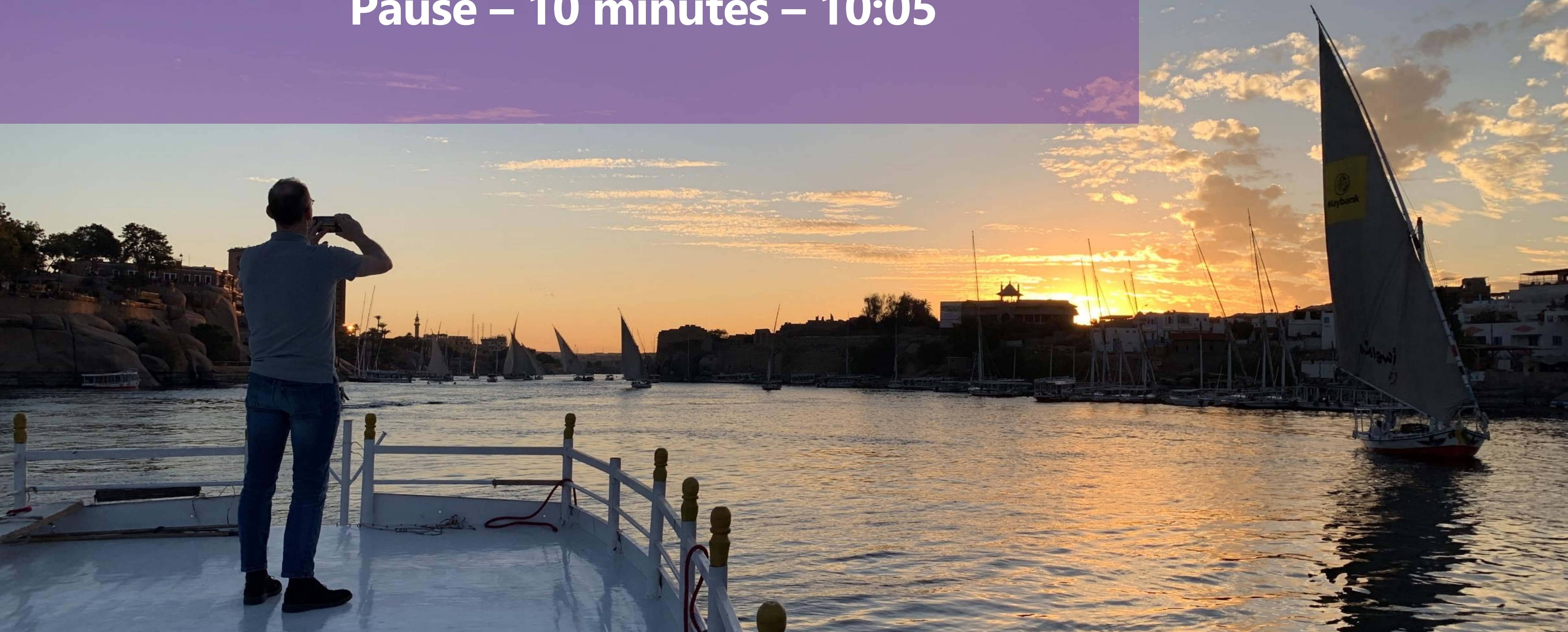

Areas for optimization and methods for upscaling

- standardization of design and replication
- planning incremental upscaling
- financial and human resources allocation
- redefining the anticipated risks given the wider scale of implementation
- monitoring of progress including the definition of key performance indicators.

A guidebook on risk-informed planning and heat mitigation

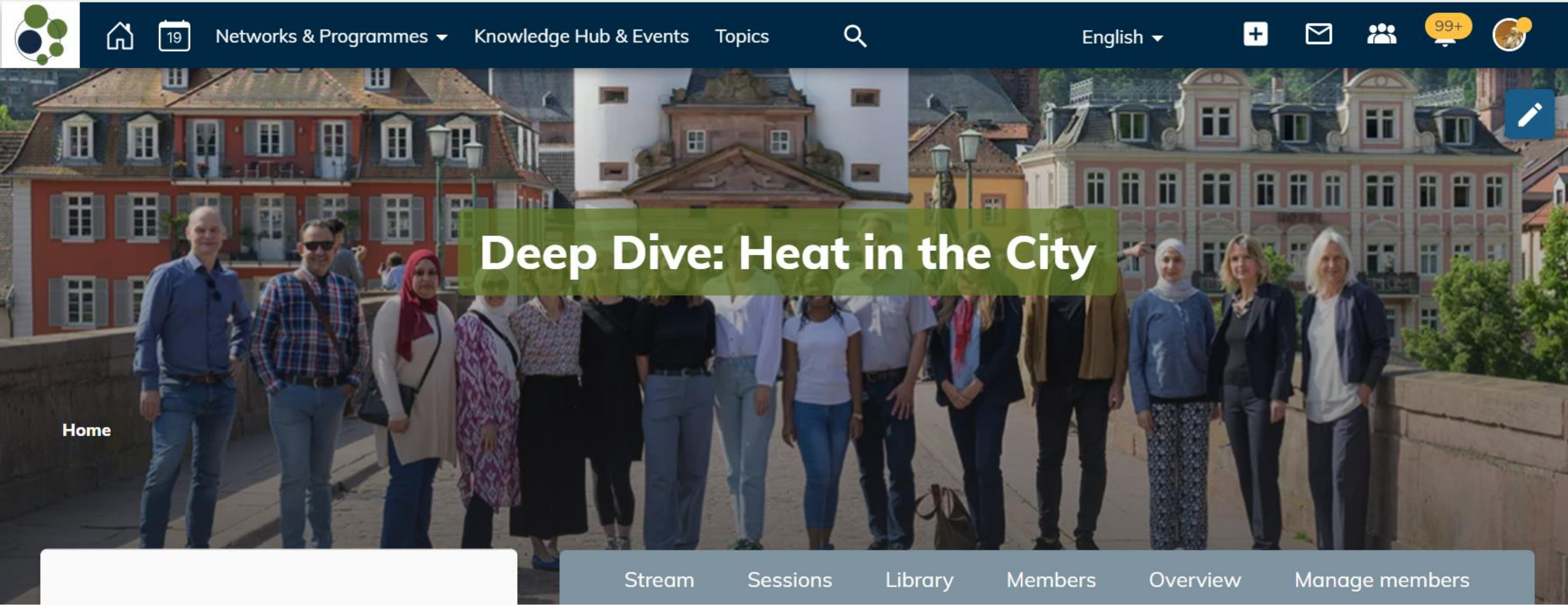
Practical guide for municipal actors, urban planners, policymakers, and community leaders seeking to adopt risk-informed approach and to integrate heat adaptation into their planning processes.
